A Word from the Pastor

Fall is here! As we enter the month of October, we focus our attention on the last of our congregation's core values: *welcoming the stranger*. This value is not only central to our mission as a church, but it also reflects a deep biblical mandate that runs throughout Scripture. In both the Old and New Testaments, we are reminded that welcoming those who are new, different, or in need is at the very heart of God's desire for His people. Hospitality is not merely a kind gesture—it is a faithful response to God's love for us.

In **Deuteronomy 10:19**, God commands His people, "You shall also love the stranger, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt." This call to empathy and welcome is rooted in the shared human experience of displacement and need. Later, in **Matthew 25:35–45**, Jesus reinforces this calling in powerful and challenging terms: "I was a stranger and you welcomed me... Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these... you did it to me." These verses remind us that when we welcome others, we are encountering Christ himself—and when we fail to do so, we are missing an opportunity to serve our Savior.

Throughout October, we will reflect together on what it means to be a church that truly welcomes the stranger—through worship, fellowship, and concrete opportunities to reach out to others. Whether it's greeting someone new in worship, warmly greeting a neighbor, or making space for someone whose story is different from our own, each act of hospitality is a sacred offering. I encourage each of us to take time this month to ask: Who is the "stranger" in my life right now, and how can I welcome them in Christ's name?

And please don't forget: our quarterly congregational meeting will be held on **Sunday, October 19th**. This is a time to come together, celebrate what God is doing in our community, and discern where we are being led next. Your presence and participation are so important. May this month be one where we live out our calling with open doors and open hearts.

Quarterly Business Meeting and Potluck on October 19

The congregation will be asked to approve a Settled Pastor Agreement between Pastor Stephen and the church that would call Pastor Stephen to serve as our settled pastor beginning November 1, 2025. His term as Covenant Pastor will end on October 31, 2025.

The 2026 Proposed Budget, designed by the boards and committees of the church over the past several months, and approved by the Church Council, will be presented to the congregation for adoption.

The members of our church will receive the text of the Settled Pastor Agreement, the 2026 Proposed Budget, and the slate of 2026 officers and board members by mail or email in early October, well in advance of the quarterly meeting.

Trustees at Work

The Trustees have received two proposals from MEI, our elevator service company, to repair the church elevator, which has been out of service since June 22, 2025.

The first proposal, to replace the main control board at a cost of \$14,571.33, was approved by the congregation at a special business meeting on Sunday, July 6. Unfortunately, replacing the control board did not solve the problem with the elevator.

A second proposal, to replace additional control boards and update software, at a cost of \$43,913.49, is now being evaluated by our insurance company, Church Mutual, and its affiliate, the Hartford Steam Boiler Company.

The Trustees are waiting to learn how much of that cost will be covered by our insurance.

The lengthy delay in getting the elevator repaired has been frustrating for the Trustees and for those who regularly use the elevator. We appreciate your patience.

FEEDING THE HUNGRY OUTREACH

Jesus fed the 5,000 with just five loaves of bread and two fish. "Feed the hungry," was Christ's teaching. Compassion through feeding. When the call went out from the Guest House in Milwaukee that it was running low on food -- particularly sandwiches -- for distribution, our church answered. In late August, following the worship service, many of our church members gathered in Fellowship Hall to make peanut butter and jelly sandwiches. *Over 100 sandwiches were made and donated!*





The mission of the Guest House is to provide "shelter, housing, education, and services to Milwaukee's homeless who seek to transform their lives with dignity and purpose." In 1981 the Central City Churches Outreach sought a community-based solution to assist the growing number of homeless in the inner city. Guest House opened its doors the following year to serve the short term needs of the homeless. Today it offers a full continuum of services to address issues of homelessness and housing instability. It currently serves over 1,229+ men, women, and families, as well as sheltering 86 men at night and providing daily meals. "Guest House saved my life," said Roberto, a Guest House client.
