### **Fall Financial Campaign**

Each year, during the month of November, the Finance Committee conducts a campaign to raise funds to support the next year's budget. We encourage our members to take stock of all that God has given them in 2025, and then to set goals for their use of time, talents, and finances in 2026.

As part of the campaign, each member will be asked to complete an *Estimate of Giving* for 2026. Only one person in the church, the Financial Recorder, sees those estimates, but the total of all estimates is helpful to the Finance Committee and Board of Trustees in their roles as stewards of the church's financial resources.

The congregation adopted a 2026 budget of \$168,451 at the October 19 quarterly business meeting. Please participate in the campaign by making an *Estimate of Giving* for 2026. *Estimate of Giving* forms will be distributed at church and sent by mail or email. Completed forms may be placed in the offering at worship or mailed to the church in care of the Financial Recorder.

#### **Trustees at Work**

The church elevator is back in service after four months of being out of order, apparently due to damage caused by a power surge. The final installation of control boards was completed by MEI, our elevator service company, on Oct 22.

The total cost of the elevator repairs was \$58,484.82. However, our insurance company, Church Mutual, has covered all of the cost except for our deductible of \$10,000.

Several recent gifts, designated for the Capital Fund or elevator repair, will be sufficient to cover the unexpected \$10,000 expense.
